

## Fundraising Campaign Ideas

**The Queen of Katwe. By Tim Crothers.** A Story of Life, Chess, and One Extraordinary Girl's Dream of Becoming a Grandmaster. This book has recently been published as a Disney Movie.

**Nightmare Along the River Nile. By Suzanna E. Nelson.** About the LRA. Find out in this compelling narrative about a young man and his friends whose story will remain with you for a long time to come.

**Mountains of the Moon. By I.J. Kay.** Told in multilayered, hallucinatory flashbacks, Mountains of the Moon explores the journey of a young woman trying to transform a broken life into something beautiful.
